### AT HOME EXERCISE Reading Reviews

What do readers say (or what do you wish they'd say) about your writing and how it makes them feel?

- List emotions/positive descriptions you see mentioned regularly (IE: transported, hopeful, happy, sad, LOL funny, surprised, page-turner, steamy, excited, all the feels, etc.) and analyze your writing to determine what aspects may be contributing to that effect.

#### AT HOME EXERCISE Analyze and Copy

#### Choose three authors whose voices you love and would love to have inspire your own voice.

First, study the technical aspects (sentence/paragraph length, sentence structure, etc.) that make each one's voice unique.

Next, word-for-word copy at least one page from each of their books—preferably using pen and paper if you're able.

Finally, write or rewrite a page of your own work and see what's changed.

#### AT HOME EXERCISE Create a Stylesheet

# A stylesheet is a list of personal rules for your writing that you can refer to for consistency across all your work.

This list can include: sentence structure, dialogue tag preferences, words you will or won't use, preferred spellings (gray vs grey), and anything else you can identify.

You can also create unique stylesheets for a particular genre or series, but unless you're writing under a different name many of the rules should remain the same.

### AT HOME EXERCISE

#### Theme Analysis

Think about three books you've read and adored, and answer these questions:

- What are the big ideas you remember from each of their books?
- What is unique about the lens through which they see/portray the world?
- What are they trying to say with their work/what themes are they addressing?
- Where does this show up (Dialogue, actions, introspection, GMC, etc.)?

#### AT HOME EXERCISE

#### Reading Reviews

#### What do readers say (or what do you wish they'd say) about your writing and how it makes them feel?

• Read positive reviews/comments/feedback/critiques and list any mentioned two or more times.

- List emotions you see mentioned regularly (think: transported, hopeful, happy, sad, horified, surprised, shocked, horny, excited, etc. Or all the feels in every book.) and analyze your writing to determine what aspects may be contributing to that effect.
- No readers yet? No worries! Ask yourself: If you could have readers give you three complements about your writing, what would they be?

#### AT HOME EXERCISE Create Character Backgrounders

#### List each character's physical attributes, personal histories, dreams, hopes, fears, and more on paper.

- **Basics:** What do they look like? Where are they from? Job/career? Where do they live? Kind of car? Own or rent? Hobbies or passions? Age? Level of education?
- **Background:** Family/upbringing? What are their core values? What are their beliefs about themselves, others, the world? Are they glass half-full or empty? What makes them happy? How do they define success? Greatest fear? Biggest regret/mistake? Nervous tics?
- **Dialogue cues:** Big or small words or vocab specific to a career? Do they curse or use slang or colloquialisms? Accent? Are they quiet, talkative, nervous, confident, etc.? Do they speak/think in full sentences or sentence fragments? Is how they think different from how they speak?

#### AT HOME EXERCISE Create Character Stylesheets

#### Having a stylesheet for every main and secondary character ensures each one sounds unique.

Make a short list (3-8 items) of each character's most identifiable speaking and thinking traits.

This list can include: sentence structure (length, fragments or no, starting with conjunctions, etc.), words they won't use, whether they speak formally or informally, use technical or job specific jargon, and anything else you can identify.
